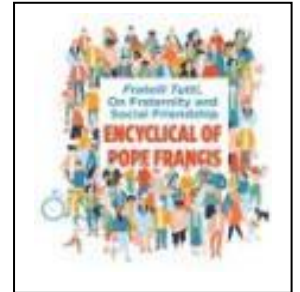

<p><b>Wednesday</b></p>	<p><b>10</b></p>	<p><b>World Lion Day</b></p> <p>An African lion’s life is all about napping, and resting with short bursts of intense activity, play, clawing at trees, followed by more sleeping that can total up to 21 hours a day!</p> <p>Lions are one of the most loved animals in the world and are a significant tourism drawcard, and tourism is a significant employer.</p> <p>Unfortunately, with the illegal wildlife trade booming, poachers lurking in the shadows, poor regulation of legal trade, disease (tuberculosis and feline immunodeficiency virus), habitat loss and climate change - lions are disappearing at an alarming rate. <i>At the current rate of habitat loss and poaching, African lions could be completely extinct by 2050.</i></p> <p>Lions are currently listed as “vulnerable” on the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List of Threatened Species. In some parts of Africa, lions are classified as “critically endangered” because lion populations are still plummeting at an unprecedented rate. “Lion farming” and canned hunting were outlawed in South Africa in 2021, but sadly the black-market trade in lions and lion bones continues.</p> <p>Without lions, herbivores would increase in population and overgraze on the natural foliage depleting the health of their ecosystem.</p> <p>Can we afford to lose such an iconic animal?</p> <p><a href="#"><i>Archbishop Desmond Tutu: Prayer for Lions</i></a></p> <p>God, Creator of all there is;  Human beings, wildlife, plant life  Everything in your universe is so utterly beautiful  And you have said: “Be fruitful and multiply”.  We pray for predators who go around destroying your creation, Beautiful animals  Wildlife is at risk because of this predators. 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

<p><b>Saturday</b></p>	<p>13</p>	<p><b>Encyclical Letter <i>Fratelli Tutti</i> of Pope Francis on the Fraternity and Social Friendship</b></p> <p><b>Chapter Two</b> <b>The context</b></p> <p>This parable has to do with an age-old problem. Shortly after its account of the creation of the world and of man, the Bible takes up the issue of human relationships. Cain kills his brother Abel and then hears God ask: “Where is your brother Abel?” (Gen 4:9). His answer is one that we ourselves all too often give: “Am I my brother’s keeper?” (ibid.). By the very question he asks, God leaves no room for an appeal to determinism or fatalism as a justification for our own indifference. Instead, he encourages us to create a different culture, in which we resolve our conflicts and care for one another.</p> <p>58. The Book of Job sees our origin in the one Creator as the basis of certain common rights: “Did not he who made me in the womb also make him? And did not the same one fashion us in the womb?” (Job 31:15). Many centuries later, Saint Irenaeus would use the image of a melody to make the same point: “One who seeks the truth should not concentrate on the differences between one note and another, thinking as if each was created separately and apart from the others; instead, he should realize that one and the same person composed the entire melody”.<sup>[54]</sup></p> <p>59. In earlier Jewish traditions, the imperative to love and care for others appears to have been limited to relationships between members of the same nation. The ancient commandment to “love your neighbour as yourself” (Lev 19:18) was usually understood as referring to one’s fellow citizens, yet the boundaries gradually expanded, especially in the Judaism that developed outside of the land of Israel. We encounter the command not to do to others what you would not want them to do to you (cf. Tob 4:15). In the first century before Christ, Rabbi Hillel stated: “This is the entire Torah. Everything else is commentary”.<sup>[55]</sup> The desire to imitate God’s own way of acting gradually replaced the tendency to think only of those nearest us: “The compassion of man is for his neighbour, but the compassion of the Lord is for all living beings” (Sir 18:13).</p> <p><b><i>Prayerfully consider how this is affecting our own Country</i></b></p>

<p><b>Thursday</b></p>	<p><b>18</b></p>	<p><b>The Throne in Heaven - Revelation 4:1-11</b></p> <p>4 After this I looked, and there before me was a door standing open in heaven. And the voice I had first heard speaking to me like a trumpet said, “Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this.”<sup>2</sup> At once I was in the Spirit, and there before me was a throne in heaven with someone sitting on it.<sup>3</sup> And the one who sat there had the appearance of jasper and ruby. A rainbow that shone like an emerald encircled the throne.<sup>4</sup> Surrounding the throne were twenty-four other thrones, and seated on them were twenty-four elders. They were dressed in white and had crowns of gold on their heads.<sup>5</sup> From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings and peals of thunder. In front of the throne, seven lamps were blazing. These are the seven spirits of God.<sup>6</sup> Also in front of the throne there was what looked like a sea of glass, clear as crystal.</p> <p>In the centre, around the throne, were four living creatures, and they were covered with eyes, in front and in back.<sup>7</sup> The first living creature was like a lion, the second was like an ox, the third had a face like a man, the fourth was like a flying eagle.<sup>8</sup> Each of the four living creatures had six wings and was covered with eyes all around, even under its wings. Day and night they never stop saying:</p> <p>“Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty, who was, and is, and is to come.”</p> <p><sup>9</sup> Whenever the living creatures give glory, honour and thanks to him who sits on the throne and who lives for ever and ever, <sup>10</sup> the twenty-four elders fall down before him who sits on the throne and worship him who lives for ever and ever. They lay their crowns before the throne and say:</p> <p><sup>11</sup> “You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being.”</p>	
<p><b>Friday</b></p>	<p><b>19</b></p>	<p><b>International Orangutan Day</b></p> <p>With their distinctive red hair, orangutans are the only great ape to live outside of Africa. Feasting on fruit, they spend nearly their entire lives in trees, and are vital for healthy forests.</p> <p>“Orangutans are intelligent, self-aware beings worthy of our respect,” said Ian Redmond, an orangutan expert. “A keystone species, as they feed they prune trees, disperse seeds and fertilise soil with their droppings.”</p>	

		<p>It is surprising to learn that orangutan conservation has a global implication which impacts on each of us. Many of the seeds of trees in the rainforests of southeast Asia rely on orangutan faeces to germinate. These rainforests pump water vapour into the atmosphere forming weather systems that deliver rain thousands of miles away. So, in saving orangutans and their habitat, we save countless other species. Save apes to save forests to save the world!</p> <p>However, wild Orangutans are facing extinction in their home rainforest habitats on the islands of Sumatra and Borneo. Rainforests on these two islands are being destroyed to grow palm oil trees and with palm oil an ingredient in half of the products in supermarkets we need to check that the products we buy use palm oil from ethically produced sources.</p> <p><b><i>Are you aware of the palm oil content in the products you use?</i></b></p>
<p><b>Saturday</b></p>	<p><b>20</b></p>	<p><b>World Mosquito Day</b></p> <p>Malaria is a disease transmitted by parasite-bearing female Anopheles mosquitoes that's rife in north-eastern KZN, Limpopo and Mpumalanga. But recent headlines suggest you could you be at risk in urban areas too.</p> <p>The reason for this, is because mosquitoes don't necessarily stay in one place. Like other cases of malaria, taxi malaria – also called Odyssean or airport malaria – is caused by mosquitoes carrying the malaria parasite. However, in these cases, the mosquitoes have unfortunately hitched a ride on a vehicle travelling out of the malaria area. This means you can get sick, even if you haven't been near a zone that would typically put you at risk.”</p> <p>As with any other malaria infection, taxi malaria begins with non-specific symptoms, such as fever, chills, headaches, fatigue and muscle pain. The problem, of course, is that these symptoms present in a range of illnesses and conditions, from COVID-19 to flu. This means few people think of mentioning the possibility of taxi malaria to their healthcare provider and won't be tested for the disease. That's unfortunate, since if diagnosed early, malaria can be treated with oral medication. If untreated, it can progress to become a severe and life-threatening illness.</p> <p>While the risk of taxi malaria is very rare, and therefore doesn't need much in terms of preventative strategies, malaria itself carries a much higher risk if you've been to a malaria area – especially if you haven't taken oral prophylaxis. If you're planning a trip to a malaria area, consult your healthcare provider about the most appropriate regimen for you.</p> <p>Obviously, it's best to avoid getting bitten in the first place and you can take simple preventative measures, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• applying insect repellent liberally and often</li> <li>• wearing long-sleeved clothes and trousers when outdoors – especially between dawn and dusk</li> <li>• using a fan and mosquito net when you sleep.</li> </ul>



		<p>Finally, if you develop non-specific flu-like illness after having visited a malaria area, speak to your healthcare provider – a simple test with a blood sample will confirm the diagnosis.</p> <p><b>Pray for:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Continued breakthroughs in research involved with mosquito-borne diseases</li> <li>• For the many people affected by and infected with these diseases</li> <li>• For the necessary funding to be available for combating this problem</li> </ul>

<b>Monday</b>	<b>22</b>	<p><b>Nature as a Mirror of God</b></p> <p>What some now call creation spirituality, deep salvation, or the holistic Gospel, was voiced long ago by some Eastern fathers, in the spirituality of the ancient Celts, by many of the Rhineland mystics, and surely by Francis of Assisi. Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179) communicated creation spirituality through music, art, poetry, medicine, gardening, and reflections on nature. She wrote in her famous book, <i>Scivias</i>:</p>  <p>You understand so little of what is around you because you do not use what is within you.</p> <p>This is key to understanding Hildegard and is very similar to Teresa of Ávila's understanding of the soul. Without using the word, she recognized that the human person is a <i>microcosm</i> with a natural affinity for or resonance with its <i>macrocosm</i>, which many call God. Our little world reflects the big world. The key word here is <i>resonance</i>. Contemplative prayer allows your mind to <i>resonate</i> with what is visible and right in front of you. <i>Contemplation is the end of all loneliness because it erases the separateness between the seer and the seen.</i></p> <p>Hildegard spoke often of <i>viriditas</i>, the greening of things from within, similar to what we now call photosynthesis. She already saw that there was a readiness in plants to receive the sun and to transform it into energy and life. She recognized that there is also an inherent connection between the physical</p>



		<p>world and the divine Presence. This connection translates into inner energy that is the soul and seed of everything, an inner voice calling you to “Become who you are; become all that you are.” This is our “life wish” or “whole-making instinct.”</p> <p>Hildegard is a wonderful example of someone who lives safely inside an entire cosmology, a universe where the inner shows itself in the outer, and the outer reflects the inner, where the individual reflects the cosmos, and the cosmos reflects the individual. Hildegard says, “O Holy Spirit, you are the mighty way in which everything that is in the heavens, on the earth, and under the earth, is penetrated with connectedness, penetrated with relatedness.” It is truly a Trinitarian universe, with all things whirling toward one another from orbits, to gravity, to ecosystems, to sexuality.</p> <p>In another place, Hildegard has God saying:</p> <p>I have created mirrors in which I consider all the wonders of my originality which will never cease.</p> <p>Indeed, for Hildegard nature was a mirror for the soul and a mirror for God. This mirroring affects a complete change in consciousness in how most of us see and experience reality. Later, Bonaventure (1217-1274) wrote: “In the soul’s journey to God we must present to ourselves <i>the whole material world</i> as the first mirror through which we may pass over to the Supreme [Artisan].” The Dominican Meister Eckhart (1260-1327) said the same: “If humankind could have known God without the world, God would never have created the world.”</p> <p>Creation is not a mere scenic backdrop so humans can take over the stage. Creation is in fact a full participant in human transformation, since the outer world is absolutely needed to mirror the true inner world. <p><b>Friday</b></p>	<p><b>26</b></p>	<p><b>World Wild Dog Day</b></p> <p>Wild dog populations are under threat – but there is hope for the future. Could African wild dog (painted wolf) populations double by 2050? A theory of change offered in a new report proposes it may be possible to save one of Africa’s most endangered carnivores – through collaboration, recovering former territory and improved funding.</p> <p>These athletic predators have suffered centuries of persecution, and the space available to them is ever-shrinking. Conservationists and scientists from the <a href="#">Painted Wolf Foundation</a> have compiled a comprehensive assessment of the state of painted wolf conservation – from population estimates to conservation strategies – and hypothesise that numbers could double in the best-case scenario</p> <p>Populations of these beautiful charismatic dogs are relatively stable at present, but habitat loss and fragmentation is remains a major threat to them. Wild dogs are also victims of the illegal bushmeat trade, as snares and gin traps intended for antelope are indiscriminate. Outbreaks of diseases such as distemper or rabies, carried by domestic dogs, can wipe out entire packs. Road accidents are also common causes of wild dog mortalities in some areas. <a href="#">Conflict with farmers</a> occurs throughout the wild dog range, even though their reputation as mass livestock killers far exceeds their actual impact.</p> <p>All of the above threats are exacerbated by the fact that wild dogs struggle to persist with high densities of competing predators like lions and spotted hyenas. As most of Africa’s wildlife is now concentrated in protected areas, wild dogs are forced to exist on the periphery of these regions, increasing their chances of encountering anthropogenic threats.</p> <p>Along with procuring enough funding for continued research and action, education is key to protecting painted wolves and improving conservation efforts. This includes changing the image and perception of wild dogs (as vermin, feral dogs).</p> <p><i><b>Pray for all involved in this critical research and programme management and that funding would be made available for this important work.</b></i></p>

And the voice I had first heard speaking to me like a trumpet said, "Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this." <sup>2</sup> At once I was in the Spirit, and there before me was a throne in heaven with someone sitting on it. <sup>3</sup> And the one who sat there had the appearance of jasper and ruby. A rainbow that shone like an emerald encircled the throne. <sup>4</sup> Surrounding the throne were twenty-four other thrones, and seated on them were twenty-four elders. They were dressed in white and had crowns of gold on their heads. <sup>5</sup> From the throne came flashes of lightning, rumblings and peals of thunder. In front of the throne, seven lamps were blazing. These are the seven spirits of God. <sup>6</sup> Also in front of the throne there was what looked like a sea of glass, clear as crystal.</p> <p>In the centre, around the throne, were four living creatures, and they were covered with eyes, in front and in back. <sup>7</sup> The first living creature was like a lion, the second was like an ox, the third had a face like a man, the fourth was like a flying eagle. <sup>8</sup> Each of the four living creatures had six wings and was covered with eyes all around, even under its wings. Day and night they never stop saying:</p> <p>"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord God Almighty, who was, and is, and is to come."</p> <p><sup>9</sup> Whenever the living creatures give glory, honour and thanks to him who sits on the throne and who lives for ever and ever, <sup>10</sup> the twenty-four elders fall down before him who sits on the throne and worship him who lives for ever and ever. They lay their crowns before the throne and say:</p> <p><sup>11</sup> "You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power, for you created all things, and by your will they were created and have their being."</p>

<p><b>Wednesday</b></p>	<p><b>31</b></p>	<p><b>African Traditional Medicine (uMuthi) Day</b></p> <p>About 80% of Africa's population relies on traditional medicine for their basic health needs. In some cases traditional medicine is the only healthcare service available, accessible and affordable to many people on the continent. In this case the significant contribution of traditional medicine as a major provider of healthcare services in Africa cannot be underestimated.</p>  <p>Medicinal plants remain relevant to human development and welfare, with traditional values among many indigenous communities, but indiscriminate harvesting of medicinal plants in the wild has an impact on sustainability of medicinal plants, which leads to the need for intervention in terms of conservation strategies. One of the key factors that has resulted in the extinction of various plant species is increased human activities especially their indiscriminate over-harvesting. Even though demand is increasing, many medicinal plant species remain uncultivated, although research, discussion and development is being carried out at a few South African Universities.</p> <p>In contemporary South Africa, medicinal plants have become the subject of extensive discussions among conservationists, policymakers, economists, due to their contribution to healthcare and potential as a vehicle for economic development and poverty alleviation. Negotiations regarding the balancing of sustainable harvesting with supply demand is complicated.</p> <p><b><i>Pray for those involved in negotiations in this delicate matter.</i></b></p>
