A love capable of transcending borders is the basis of what in every city and country can be called “social friendship”. Genuine social friendship within a society makes true universal openness possible. This is a far cry from the false universalism of those who constantly travel abroad because they cannot tolerate or love their own people. Those who look down on their own people tend to create within society categories of first and second class, people of greater or lesser dignity, people enjoying greater or fewer rights. In this way, they deny that there is room for everybody.</p> <p>100. I am certainly not proposing an authoritarian and abstract universalism, devised or planned by a small group and presented as an ideal for the sake of levelling, dominating and plundering. One model of globalization in fact “consciously aims at a one-dimensional uniformity and seeks to eliminate all differences and traditions in a superficial quest for unity... If a certain kind of globalization claims to make everyone uniform, to level everyone out, that globalization destroys the rich gifts and uniqueness of each person and each people”.<sup>[78]</sup> This false universalism ends up depriving the world of its various colours, its beauty and, ultimately, its humanity. For “the future is not monochrome; if we are courageous, we can contemplate it in all the variety and diversity of what each individual person has to offer. <p><b>Wednesday</b></p>	<p><b>10</b></p>	<p><b>Celebrating Birds of Prey</b></p> <p>In the US, the 10<sup>th</sup> of January is designated as “Save the Eagles Day” as a reminder of the majestic raptors that soar above the Earth. In South Africa, we have no such day, but this gives us an opportunity none the less, of celebrating our own magnificent array of raptors occurring here at home.</p> <p>Our Birds of Prey – also known as raptors - are the majestic lords of the skies and South Africa is fortunate to host 83 species – some resident and some migrants.</p> <p>The term “birds of prey” (raptors) include a wide variety of species that regularly occur in southern Africa and fall into various groups - Falcons and Kestrels Goshawks and Sparrowhawks, Harriers, Kites, Owls and Owlets, Snake Eagles and Vultures.</p> <p>However, our magnificent birds of prey face a wide range of threats. Poisoning, in particular, is driving many species towards extinction in the wild. They are also threatened by habitat loss and fragmentation, collisions and electrocutions on energy infrastructure, and persecution. Birds of prey, particularly vultures, are some of the most threatened animals on the planet. Of the six regionally Critically Endangered species in South Africa, four are vultures (Bearded, Hooded, White-backed and White-headed Vultures), along with the Taita Falcon and Southern Banded Snake Eagle.</p> <p><b><i>How we can help birds of prey</i></b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Prevent the unnecessary poisoning of birds of prey - Do not use rodenticides, even if they claim to be raptor friendly</li> <li>• Hunters and Fishermen - use non-lead hunting ammunition and fishing tackle.</li> <li>• Plant indigenous thus providing habitat and cover and reduces the need for pesticides. While raptors don't directly rely on plants for food, they may rely on other animals that do. Healthy biodiversity means healthier ecosystems, and seeing a raptor or owl is a sign that an ecosystem is thriving.</li> <li>• Be particular about waste disposal.</li> <li>• Report any injured or killed raptors on powerlines to the EWT toll-free number <b>0860 111 535</b> or <a href="#">email EWT</a> to trigger the Eskom Wildlife Incident Management Process</li> <li>• Report sightings of tagged raptors, including ringed raptors, GPS tagged, or wing tagged vultures, by <a href="#">emailing EWT</a></li> </ul> <p><b>It is our duty to protect these magnificent birds – so special in God’s Creation! <i>Enjoy and marvel at our majestic lords of the skies!</i></b></p>

In my work with men's initiation, I've found that all great spiritual wisdom, all true soul wisdom, can be found in nature. I do believe that's true. St. Francis didn't learn by only reading Bibles and books, but by observing the natural world, which we call "the first Bible" (see Romans 1:20).

When you sit quietly and for extended times in nature, you see that everything changes. If you stay longer, you see that everything dies or erodes. Nothing stays in the same shape or form for long. Plants and animals seem to accept this dying. All of the natural world seems to accept the change of seasons. Nature fights for life but does not resist dying. It learns gravity's fall, as it were. Only one species resists this natural movement: humans—you and me. The very freedom that can lead us into intimacy with an utterly free God who invites our cooperation and participation also allows us to resist, oppose, or deny Love. We are free to cling to our own egoic resources, to climb instead of to descend. But we must fall if we are ever to fly.

Meister Eckhart said, "God is not found in the soul by adding anything, but by a process of subtraction." In our consumer culture, religion and spirituality have very often become a matter of addition: earning points with God, attaining enlightenment, producing moral behaviour. Yet authentic spirituality is not about getting, attaining, achieving, performing, or succeeding—all of which tend to pander to the ego. It is much more about letting go—letting go of what we don't need anyway, although we don't know that ahead of time. On the mental level, it is more "the shedding of thoughts," as the Desert Fathers called it, than piling on more thoughts.





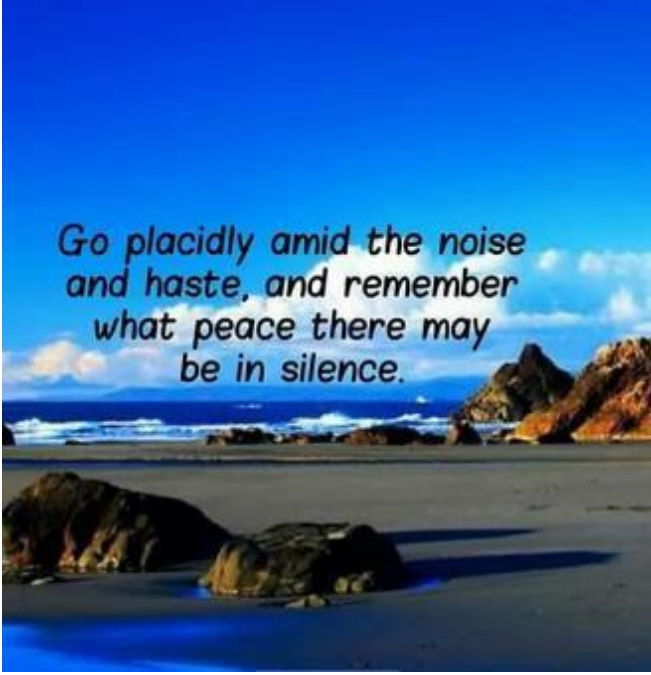

<p><b>Wednesday</b></p>	<p><b>17</b></p>	<p><b>Birdlife Bird of the Year 2024</b></p> <p>Birdlife SA has named the majestic <b>Bateleur</b> as Bird of the Year 2024.</p> <p>Known as the <i>berghaan</i> in Afrikaans, <i>ingqungqulu</i> in Zulu and <i>Ingqanga</i> in Xhosa, the bateleur is famous for its striking appearance and remarkable aerial behaviour. The eagle’s English name, bateleur, was coined by François Le Vaillant, a famed 18th-century French explorer, writer and ornithologist, and is said to be French for a “tumbler” or “tightrope walker”. This “aptly describes this bird’s graceful, aerial acrobatics.</p> <p>The bateleur is a truly charismatic and eye-catching bird of prey, with its distinctive plumage - and combination of black, white and vibrant red-orange on the face and legs, it is equally at home in the bushveld of the Kruger National Park and the arid Kalahari.</p>







		<p>The bateleur is sexually dimorphic, meaning that males and females can be differentiated based on their plumage or appearance. This is most easily done when they are in flight by looking at their underwing pattern</p> <p>Bateleurs are however in trouble, being classified as regionally endangered with an estimated population reduction of more than 50% over the past 40 years. The regional population size is estimated at fewer than 1 000 mature individuals. Their decline is due to loss of habitat, habitat transformation which has led to a decrease in their available prey base, especially outside protected areas. The tendency of bateleurs to scavenge, too, puts them at particular risk from indiscriminate poisoning, especially by small stock farmers. Indiscriminate illegal killing for use in the muti trade is another recent trend which is concerning.</p> <p><b><i>Pray for all concerned in conserving and protecting this magnificent bird. Challenge yourself to find out more about it so that you too can do all you can to protect this incredible bird!</i></b></p>

Zebras are sturdy, spirited animals that are a study in contrasts: willful and playful, social and standoffish, resilient and vulnerable.
